in the 118th Congress



Dear Friends,

The LGBTQ+ community is growing in strength every day. With a record-high 75 million Equality Voters nationwide, informed voting and representation matters now more than ever. Throughout the 118th Congress, we have seen both the legislative backlash targeting the LGBTQ+ community and the unrelenting power we have to push progress forward.

Amidst the Human Rights Campaign's first ever National State of Emergency, anti-equality Members of Congress decided to echo the anti-LGBTQ+ extremist policies pioneered in the states. The 118th Congress had an unprecedented number of anti-LGBTQ+ votes, the majority of which specifically targeted the transgender community.

Republican leadership in the House of Representatives decided to use the annual appropriations bills and the National Defense Authorization Act to advance dozens of anti-LGBTQ+ provisions. These anti-equality measures threatened to restrict transgender health care, prohibit enforcement of civil rights protections, ban Pride flags and drag performances, eliminate diversity, equity, and inclusion programs, and allow licenses to discriminate against LGBTQ+ people. House Republican leaders largely refused to allow floor votes on amendments to strike these provisions. Fortunately, despite House Republicans' best attempts, we have prevented more than 100 anti-LGBTQ+ riders from being signed into law, a true testament to our organizing power.

The Senate saw far fewer attempts to attack the freedom of LGBTQ+ people. They stood firm against the extreme House legislation, and instead largely considered legislation to defend freedom with votes to expand voting rights, protect access to IVF and contraception, and secure the fundamental right to abortion and reproductive health care in the wake of the Supreme Court's *Dobbs* decision.

Furthermore, the last two years saw an increase in openly LGBTQ+ officials, judges, and ambassadors. The historic appointment of Senator Laphonza Butler (D-CA) gave us the first Black lesbian to serve in the Senate, joining Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Kyrsten Sinema (I-AZ) for a record number of openly LGBTQ+ Senators. In the courts, Nicole Berner is now the first openly LGBTQ+ person to ever serve on the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals and only the third openly LGBTQ+ woman to serve on any federal appellate court. Long-time allies to the LGBTQ+ community were confirmed as well. Life-long champion for equality and employment rights, Kalpana Kotagal, was confirmed as the Commissioner of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), and looking abroad, Stephanie Sanders Sullivan was confirmed as Ambassador to the African Union after withstanding attacks from extremists for her support of global LGBTQ+ rights.

We hope the 118th Congressional Scorecard will help you to stay informed on your elected officials' records on key issues that impact the LGBTQ+ community. We hope it serves as a valuable tool in holding your elected officials accountable in our shared efforts towards achieving equality without exception.

EDUCATION

A Resolution of Disapproval for Food and Nutrition Service Non-Discrimination Policy (S.J.Res. 42)
This resolution would have blocked a Food and Nutrition Service policy update implementing the Supreme Court's decision in *Bostock v. Clayton County* to provide non-discrimination based on sexual orientation and gender identity in school lunch programs. The Senate defeated the resolution on October 26, 2023, by a vote of 47-50 (Roll Call Vote No. 272, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 46 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 0 yes, 2 no, 1 not voting; Republicans – 46 yes, 2 no, 1 not voting. *HRC opposed the resolution.*

B Motion to Table the Tuberville Amendment to the FY24 Further Consolidated Appropriations Act (S.Amdt. 1781 to H.R. 2882)
The Tuberville Amendment would have prohibited funds to schools that allow transgender girls to participate in athletic programs consistent with their gender identity. The Senate passed the motion to table the amendment on March 23, 2024, by a vote of 51-47 (Roll Call Vote No. 108, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 48 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Republicans – 0 yes, 47 no, 2 not voting. *HRC supported the motion to table the amendment.*

PRIDE BAN

C Marshall Amendment to FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (S.Amdt. 874 to S.Amdt. 935)
The Marshall Amendment would have prohibited the flying, draping, or other display of Pride flags at public buildings. The Senate defeated the amendment on July 27, 2023, by a vote of 50-49. (Roll Call Vote No. 204, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 46 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 0 yes, 3 no, 0 not voting; Republicans – 49 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH CARE

D Cloture on the Motion to Proceed to the Right to Contraception Act (S. 4381)
The Right to Contraception Act would protect access to contraceptives. The Senate rejected cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill on June 5, 2024, by a vote of 51-39 (Roll Call Vote No. 190, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats - 46 yes, 1 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Republicans – 2 yes, 38 no, 9 not voting. *HRC supported cloture on the motion to proceed.*

E Cloture on the Motion to Proceed to the Right to IVF Act (S. 4445)
The Right to IVF Act would protect and expand access to IVF and other assisted reproductive technology. The Senate rejected cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill on September 17, 2024, by a vote of 51-44 (Roll Call Vote No. 242, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 46 yes, 0 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 1 not voting; Republicans – 2 yes, 44 no, 3 not voting. *HRC supported cloture on the motion to proceed.*

F Cloture on the Motion to Proceed to the Reproductive Freedom for Women Act (S. 4554)
The Reproductive Freedom for Women Act would express support for access to abortion and other reproductive health care. The Senate rejected cloture on the motion to proceed to the bill on July 10, 2024, by a vote of 49-44 (Roll Call Vote No. 211, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 44 yes, 1 no, 2 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 1 not voting; Republicans – 2 yes, 43 no, 4 not voting. *HRC supported cloture on the motion to proceed.*

NOMINATIONS

G Confirmation of Kalpana Kotagal to be a Member of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission
On July 13, 2023, the Senate voted on President Biden's nomination of Kalpana Kotagal to be a Member of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. The Senate confirmed her nomination by a vote of 49-47 (Roll Call Vote No. 184, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 46 yes, 1 no, 1 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Republicans – 0 yes, 46 no, 3 not voting. *HRC supported the nomination.*

H Confirmation of Nicole Berner to be U.S. Circuit Judge for the Fourth Circuit of Appeals
On March 19, 2024, the Senate voted on President Biden's nomination of Nicole Berner to be a U.S. Circuit Judge for the Fourth Circuit. The Senate confirmed her nomination by a vote of 50-47 (Roll Call Vote No. 94, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 47 yes, 1 no, 0 not voting; Independents – 3 yes, 0 no, 0 not voting; Republicans – 0 yes, 46 no, 3 not voting. *HRC supported the nomination.*

I Confirmation of Stephanie Sanders Sullivan to be Representative of the United States of America to the African Union
On June 20, 2024, the Senate voted on President Biden's nomination of Stephanie Sanders Sullivan to be Representative of the United States of America to the African Union. The Senate confirmed her nomination by a vote of 45-26 (Roll Call Vote No. 201, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 43 yes, 0 no, 4 not voting; Independents – 1 yes, 0 no, 3 not voting; Republicans – 1 yes, 26 no, 22 not voting. *HRC supported the nomination.*

CO-SPONSORSHIPS

J Equality Act (S. 5) (Co-Sponsorship)
Senators were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on June 21, 2023, that would provide consistent and explicit non-discrimination protections for LGBTQ+ people across key areas of life, including employment, housing, credit, education, public spaces and services, federally funded programs, and jury service. The measure had 51 co-sponsors: Democrats 48; Republicans 0; Independents 3.

K Do No Harm Act (S. 1206) (Co-Sponsorship)
Senators were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on April 19, 2023, that would amend the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) to exempt areas of law where RFRA has been used to bypass federal protections, including civil rights laws, thus restoring the original intent of the legislation and clarifying that RFRA is intended to protect religious freedom without allowing the infliction of harm on other people. The measure had 39 co-sponsors: Democrats 38; Republicans 0; Independents 1.

L Therapeutic Fraud Prevention Act (S. 2176) (Co-Sponsorship)
Senators were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on June 22, 2023, that would classify the provision and advertising of conversion therapy in exchange for monetary compensation as fraudulent practices and expressly direct the Federal Trade Commission to protect consumers from these harmful and discredited practices. The measure had 46 co-sponsors: Democrats 43; Republicans 0; Independents 3.

M International Human Rights Defense Act of 2023 (S. 1007) (Co-Sponsorship)
Senators were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on March 28, 2023, that would build a framework into U.S. diplomacy to protect LGBTQ+ rights worldwide, by making preventing and responding to discrimination and violence against the LGBTQ+ community a foreign policy priority and authorizing a Special Envoy within the State Department who would serve as principal advisor to the Secretary of State on LGBTQ+ issues. The measure had 44 co-sponsors: Democrats 43; Republicans 0; Independents 1.

N John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2024 (S. 4) (Co-Sponsorship)
Senators were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on February 29, 2024, that would strengthen voting rights by expanding and strengthening the government's ability to respond to voting discrimination. The measure had 50 co-sponsors: Democrats 47; Republicans 0; Independents 3.

EDUCATION

A **Resolution of Disapproval of Title IX Non-Discrimination Rule (H.J.Res. 165)**
Rep. Mary Miller (R-IL) introduced this resolution of disapproval that would have overturned a Department of Education rule clarifying non-discrimination protections for LGBTQ+ students, survivors of sexual assault and sexual harassment, and pregnant and parenting students. The House passed the resolution on July 11, 2024, by a vote of 210-205 (Roll Call Vote No. 354, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 205 no, 8 not voting; Republicans – 210 yes, 0 no, 10 not voting. *HRC opposed the resolution.*

B **Parents Bill of Rights Act (H.R. 5)**
Rep. Julia Letlow (R-LA) introduced the Parents Bill of Rights Act that included provisions that would require forced outing of LGBTQ+ students and enable book bans. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2023, by a vote of 213-208 (Roll Call Vote No. 161, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 203 no, 10 not voting; Republicans – 213 yes, 5 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

C **Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act of 2023 (H.R. 734)**
Rep. Gregory Steube (R-FL) introduced the Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act that would ban transgender girls and women from participating in school sports consistent with their gender identity. The House passed the bill on April 20, 2023, by a vote of 219-203 (Roll Call Vote No. 192, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 203 no, 10 not voting; Republicans – 219 yes, 0 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

D **Boebert Amendment to FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 237 to H.R. 2670)**
Rep. Lauren Boebert (R-CO) offered an amendment to the FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 2670) to prohibit Department of Defense schools from having books that “espouse radical gender ideology.” The House passed the amendment on July 13, 2023, by a vote of 222-209 (Roll Call Vote No. 314, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 2 yes, 209 no, 4 not voting; Republicans – 220 yes, 0 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

E **Steube Amendment to FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 980 to H.R. 8070)**
Rep. Gregory Steube (R-FL) offered an amendment to the FY25 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 8070) to prohibit Department of Defense schools from having books that “espouse radical gender ideology.” The House passed the amendment on June 13, 2024, by a vote of 221-202 (Roll Call Vote No. 271, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 3 yes, 202 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 218 yes, 0 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

F **Boebert Amendment to FY24 Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 341 to H.R. 4368)**
Rep. Lauren Boebert (R-CO) offered an amendment to the FY24 Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4368) to prohibit the Department of Agriculture from producing books, courses, or study guides that represent LGBTQ+ people in a positive way. The House passed the amendment on September 27, 2023, by a vote of 217-214 (Roll Call Vote No. 421, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 213 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 217 yes, 1 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

NON-DISCRIMINATION

G **Norman Amendment to FY24 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 647 to H.R. 4820)**
Rep. Ralph Norman (R-SC) offered an amendment to the FY24 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4820) to prevent the Department of Housing and Urban Development from implementing a rule allowing for equal access on the basis of gender identity in community planning and development programs. The House defeated the amendment on November 7, 2023, by a vote of 212-217 (Roll Call Vote No. 619, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 212 no, 3 not voting; Republicans – 212 yes, 5 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

H **Roy Amendment to the Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny Act of 2023 (H.Amdt. 203 to H.R. 277)**
Rep. Chip Roy (R-TX) offered an amendment to the Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny Act of 2023 (H.R. 277) to require congressional approval of any of the Biden administration’s executive orders on diversity, equity, and inclusion, including EO 14075, Advancing Equality for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, and Intersex Individuals; EO 14021, Guaranteeing an Educational Environment Free From Discrimination on the Basis of Sex, Including Sexual Orientation or Gender Identity; and EO 13988, Preventing and Combating Discrimination on the Basis of Gender Identity or Sexual Orientation. The House defeated the amendment on June 14, 2023, by a vote of 217-219 (Roll Call Vote No. 262, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 213 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 217 yes, 6 no, 1 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

GENDER AFFIRMING CARE

I **Rosendale Amendment to FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 223 to H.R. 2670)**
Rep. Matthew Rosendale (R-MT) offered an amendment to the FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 2670) to prohibit TRICARE from providing gender affirming care. The House passed the amendment on July 13, 2023, by a vote of 222-211 (Roll Call Vote No. 301, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 210 no, 4 not voting; Republicans – 221 yes, 1 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

J **Rosendale Amendment to FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 986 to H.R. 8070)**
Rep. Matthew Rosendale (R-MT) offered an amendment to the FY25 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 8070) to prohibit TRICARE from providing gender affirming care. The House passed the amendment on June 13, 2024, by a vote of 213-206 (Roll Call Vote No. 262, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 205 no, 10 not voting; Republicans – 212 yes, 1 no, 8 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

K **Norman Amendment #20 to FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 224 to H.R. 2670)**
Rep. Ralph Norman (R-SC) offered an amendment to the FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 2670) to prohibit the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) from covering gender affirming care or referrals for minor dependents, and it would prohibit EFMP from facilitating any change of duty station that would allow a minor to access care elsewhere. The House passed the amendment on July 13, 2023, by a vote of 222-210 (Roll Call Vote No. 302, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 209 no, 5 not voting; Republicans – 221 yes, 1 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

L **Norman Amendment to FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 987 to H.R. 8070)**

Rep. Ralph Norman (R-SC) offered an amendment to the FY25 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 8070) to prohibit the Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) from covering gender affirming care or referrals for minor dependents, and it would prohibit EFMP from facilitating any change of duty station that would allow a minor to access care elsewhere. The House passed the amendment on June 13, 2024, by a vote of 218-205 (Roll Call Vote No. 275, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 204 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 217 yes, 1 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

HIV

M **Davidson Amendment to FY24 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 625 to H.R. 4820)**

Rep. Warren Davidson (R-OH) offered an amendment to the FY24 Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4820) to eliminate funding for the Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS program. The House defeated the amendment on November 7, 2023, by a vote of 144-282 (Roll Call Vote No. 609, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 211 no, 4 not voting; Republicans – 144 yes, 71 no, 8 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

N **Good Amendment to FY24 Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 746 to H.R. 5894)**

Rep. Bob Good (R-VA) offered an amendment to the FY24 Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 5894) to reduce the funding for the Minority AIDS Prevention Program. The House defeated the amendment on November 14, 2023, by a vote of 109-324 (Roll Call Vote No. 653, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 214 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 109 yes, 110 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

IMMIGRATION

O **Secure the Border Act of 2023 (H.R. 2)**

Rep. Mario Diaz-Balart (R-FL) introduced the Secure the Border Act which would dismantle the asylum system by codifying policies, like a third-country transit ban and entry ban, that would cause significant and irreparable harm to LGBTQ+ immigrant families and communities. The House passed the bill on May 11, 2023, by a vote of 219-213 (Roll Call Vote No. 209, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 211 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 219 yes, 2 no, 1 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

PRIDE BAN

P **Norman Amendment #34 to FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 236 to H.R. 2670)**

Rep. Ralph Norman (R-SC) offered an amendment to the FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 2670) to ban Pride flags from Department of Defense facilities, including on buildings and at individual workstations. The House passed the amendment on July 13, 2023, by a vote of 218-213 (Roll Call Vote No. 313, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 2 yes, 210 no, 3 not voting; Republicans – 216 yes, 3 no, 5 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

Q **Mills Amendment to FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act (H.Amdt. 983 to H.R. 8070)**

Rep. Cory Mills (R-FL) offered an amendment to the FY25 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 8070) to ban Pride flags from Department of Defense facilities, including on buildings and at individual workstations. The House passed the amendment on June 13, 2024, by a vote of 217-206 (Roll Call Vote No. 273, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 205 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 217 yes, 1 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

R **Roy Amendment to FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 382 to H.R. 4365)**

Rep. Chip Roy (R-TX) offered an amendment to the FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.R. 4365) to prohibit funds being used to observe Pride month. The House defeated the amendment on September 27, 2023, by a vote of 202-231 (Roll Call Vote No. 441, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 213 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 202 yes, 18 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

ATTACKS ON TRANSGENDER OFFICIALS

S **Boebert Amendment to FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 362 to H.R. 4365)**

Rep. Lauren Boebert (R-CO) offered an amendment to the FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.R. 4365) to reduce Assistant Secretary of Defense Shawn Skelly's salary to one dollar. Rep. Boebert's remarks made clear that Skelly was targeted because she is transgender. The House defeated the amendment on September 27, 2023, by a vote of 150-282 (Roll Call Vote No. 434, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 212 no, 3 not voting; Republicans – 150 yes, 70 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

T **Greene Amendment to FY24 Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.Amdt. 770 to H.R. 5894)**

Rep. Marjorie Taylor Greene (R-GA) offered an amendment to the FY24 Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services, and Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 5894) to reduce Assistant Secretary for Health Admiral Rachel Levine's salary to one dollar. Rep. Greene's remarks made clear that Levine was targeted because she is transgender. The House defeated the amendment on November 15, 2023, by a vote of 170-254-1 (Roll Call Vote No. 664, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 208 no, 0 present, 8 not voting; Republicans – 170 yes, 46 no, 1 present, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the amendment.*

BILLS WITH ANTI-LGBTQ+ RIDERS

U **FY24 National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 2670)**

The FY24 National Defense Authorization Act included provisions that would have banned gender affirming care, banned books about transgender people, banned drag performances, and banned Pride flags. The House passed the bill on July 14, 2023, by a vote of 219-210 (Roll Call Vote No. 328, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 4 yes, 206 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 215 yes, 4 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

V **FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act (H.R. 8070)**

The FY25 Servicemember Quality of Life Improvement and National Defense Authorization Act included provisions that would have banned gender affirming care, banned books about transgender people, and banned Pride flags. The House passed the bill on June 14, 2024, by a vote of 217-199 (Roll Call Vote No. 279, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 6 yes, 196 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 211 yes, 3 no, 4 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

W **FY24 Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4366)**
The FY24 Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on July 27, 2023, by a vote of 219-211 (Roll Call Vote No. 380, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 209 no, 3 not voting; Republicans – 219 yes, 2 no, 1 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

X **FY25 Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 8580)**
The FY25 Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on June 5, 2024, by a vote of 209-197 (Roll Call Vote No. 247, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 4 yes, 195 no, 14 not voting; Republicans – 205 yes, 2 no, 11 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

Y **FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.R. 4365)**
The FY24 Department of Defense Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, a ban on drag performances, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on September 28, 2023, by a vote of 218-210 (Roll Call Vote No. 502, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 2 yes, 208 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 216 yes, 2 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

Z **FY25 Department of Defense Appropriations Act (H.R. 8774)**
The FY25 Department of Defense Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, a book ban, a ban on drag performances, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2024, by a vote of 217-198 (Roll Call Vote No. 331, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 5 yes, 197 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 212 yes, 1 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

AA **FY24 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act (H.R. 4367)**
The FY24 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on September 28, 2023, by a vote of 220-208 (Roll Call Vote No. 505, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 2 yes, 208 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 218 yes, 0 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

BB **FY25 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act (H.R. 8752)**
The FY25 Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, a license to discriminate, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2024, by a vote of 212-203 (Roll Call Vote No. 333, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 5 yes, 197 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 207 yes, 6 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

CC **FY24 Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4665)**
The FY24 Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care and accompanying “transgender gag rule”, a ban on Pride flags, a ban on drag performances, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on September 28, 2023, by a vote of 216-212 (Roll Call Vote No. 500, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 210 no, 2 not voting; Republicans – 216 yes, 2 no, 3 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

DD **FY25 Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 8771)**
The FY25 Department of State, Foreign Operations, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care and accompanying “transgender gag rule”, a license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, a ban on drag performances, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on June 28, 2024, by a vote of 212-200 (Roll Call Vote No. 335, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 199 no, 13 not voting; Republicans – 211 yes, 1 no, 7 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

EE **FY24 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act (H.R. 4364)**
The FY24 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act included a license to discriminate. The House passed the bill on November 1, 2023, by a vote of 214-197 (Roll Call Vote No. 563, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 4 yes, 197 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 210 yes, 0 no, 11 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

FF **FY25 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act (H.R. 8772)**
The FY25 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act included a license to discriminate and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House defeated the bill on July 11, 2024, by a vote of 205-213 (Roll Call Vote No. 352, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 3 yes, 203 no, 7 not voting; Republicans – 202 yes, 10 no, 8 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

GG **FY24 Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4821)**
The FY24 Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on November 3, 2023, by a vote of 213-203 (Roll Call Vote No. 597, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 200 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 212 yes, 3 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

HH **FY25 Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 8998)**
The FY25 Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a ban on gender affirming care, license to discriminate, a ban on Pride flags, a ban on drag performances, and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on July 24, 2024, by a vote of 210-205 (Roll Call Vote No. 399, 2nd Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 1 yes, 200 no, 11 not voting; Republicans – 209 yes, 5 no, 6 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

II **FY24 Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act (H.R. 4394)**
The FY24 Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act included a license to discriminate and attacks on diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives. The House passed the bill on October 26, 2023, by a vote of 210-199 (Roll Call Vote No. 558, 1st Session, 118th Congress). Democrats – 0 yes, 198 no, 14 not voting; Republicans – 210 yes, 1 no, 10 not voting. *HRC opposed the bill.*

CO-SPONSORSHIPS

JJ **Equality Act (H.R. 15) (Co-Sponsorship)**
Representatives were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on June 21, 2023, that would provide consistent and explicit non-discrimination protections for LGBTQ+ people across key areas of life, including employment, housing, credit, education, public spaces and services, federally funded programs, and jury service. The measure had 218 co-sponsors: Democrats 218; Republicans 0.

KK Do No Harm Act (H.R. 2725) (Co-Sponsorship)

Representatives were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on April 19, 2023, that would amend the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) to exempt areas of law where RFRA has been used to bypass federal protections, including civil rights laws, thus restoring the original intent of the legislation and clarifying that RFRA is intended to protect religious freedom without allowing the infliction of harm on other people. The measure had 194 co-sponsors: Democrats 194; Republicans 0.

LL Therapeutic Fraud Prevention Act (H.R. 4340) (Co-Sponsorship)

Representatives were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on June 23, 2023, that would classify the provision and advertising of conversion therapy in exchange for monetary compensation as fraudulent practices and expressly direct the Federal Trade Commission to protect consumers from these harmful and discredited practices. The measure had 196 co-sponsors: Democrats 196; Republicans 0.

MM International Human Rights Defense Act of 2023 (H.R. 1833) (Co-Sponsorship)

Representatives were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on March 28, 2023, that would build a framework into U.S. diplomacy to protect LGBTQ+ rights worldwide, by making preventing and responding to discrimination and violence against the LGBTQ+ community a foreign policy priority and authorizing a Special Envoy within the State Department who would serve as principal advisor to the Secretary of State on LGBTQ+ issues. The measure had 204 co-sponsors: Democrats 204; Republicans 0.

NN John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2023 (H.R. 14) (Co-Sponsorship)

Representatives were asked to co-sponsor legislation introduced on September 19, 2023, that would strengthen voting rights by expanding and strengthening the government's ability to respond to voting discrimination. The measure had 218 co-sponsors: Democrats 218; Republicans 0.
